

PRONOUNS GUIDE

Gender affirmative pronouns are the set of pronouns that a person identifies with and would like to be called when their proper name is not being used. Some individuals may use more than one set of pronouns, and pronouns may change over time. With the inclusion of new pronouns or neopronouns, there are many pronouns in addition to the familiar she, he and they.

A person's pronouns are not "preferred", as this implies it is not necessary to use their designated pronouns. Not using the requested pronoun, or misgendering, is disrespectful, and can cause emotional harm. Similarly, one should never tell another person that their pronouns are "incorrect." Research shows that using a person's accurate pronouns is one of the most powerful ways to support a person and promote their wellbeing.

If you make a mistake, don't panic! Apologize, correct yourself, and continue the conversation. It helps to slow down so as to be able to use the correct pronoun. If you are unsure about how to use someone's pronoun, it is always better to ask than to make an assumption.

Here are some suggestions for ways to share and ask about someone's pronouns:

 Offer your name and pronouns in your introduction before asking for theirs: "What pronouns do you use?"

- Add your pronoun to name tags or badges; wear a pronoun button
- Include your pronouns with your name on virtual platforms, like Zoom

We celebrate that the singular pronoun "they" is officially grammatically correct. The *Washington Post*'s style guide ratified the usage of "they" in 2015. *Post* copy editor Bill Walsh explained that the singular they is "the only sensible solution to English's lack of a gender-neutral third person singular personal pronoun." In 2019, "they" was designated Word of the Year by Merriam-Webster, "marking the rise of the use of the venerable plural pronoun to refer to a single person whose gender is nonbinary." (*New York Times*, Dec 10, 2019).

While "he" has been considered a masculine pronoun and "she" a feminine pronoun, both pronouns can be used by all genders. They are not restricted in any way to the gender binary, and many nonbinary individuals will use one or both, often in addition to "they". Some people do not use pronouns, and just use their first or last name in place of a pronoun.

An explosion of new pronouns or neopronouns are being created as individuals develop language to describe their authentic identity and/or gender experience. Some examples of common neopronouns are: ae/aer, ey/em, shi/hir, hi/hem, vey/ver, fae/faer, kye/kyr, ze/zir, xe/xem.

she/her/hers Student, Mount Madonna School



QYLA 2023 THEME: PEACE & POSITIVITY IN THE QUEER COMMUNITY

The theme of this year's QYLA is "Peace and Positivity in the Queer Community" and was written by students from the New Brighton Middle School QSA (Queer-Straight Alliance).

The QSA has chosen a theme of cottagecore mixed with the queer fictional universe of the webcomic, graphic novel, and television show Heartstopper, created by Alice Oseman.

The title the QSA club decided on is Peace and Positivity in the Queer Community.

Cottagecore is a calm, earthy, and forestry type of aesthetic that celebrates the beauty of nature. Although there are many aesthetics that queer people identify with, cottagecore presents a way of living out of the binary, like many queer individuals. It is an aesthetic that many people feel comfortable expressing themselves with.

Heartstopper is a positive story showing some truly happy queer couples and their experiences. Heartstopper covers many topics, such as coming out, bullying, and mental health. The show normalizes these topics by portraying them not as the main theme, but as everyday circumstances that many people deal with.

Heartstopper also spreads awareness to the audience to reach out to someone if they are going through a difficult time.

Overall, the theme picked for the QYLA portrays the essence of the queer community.





2023 QUEER YOUTH LEADERSHIP AWARD

Designed to honor the leadership of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer and Questioning, Intersex and Asexual (LGBTQIA+) young people throughout Santa Cruz County.

Four awardees will receive a cash award of \$250, as well as the opportunity to designate a queer youth friendly project or nonprofit organization in their community to receive a \$500 donation.

Given annually to queer youth who are 12 to 18 years of age to acknowledge their accomplishments and the contributions they have made to their communities, whether this be in their homes, schools, religious institutions, athletic or academic teams, or other social groups.

Aiden Parten holds multiple leadership roles at Branciforte Middle School. He is currently the president of the school's Muskequeers club, where he creates weekly agendas and leads club activities, in addition to his role as Student Body President, where he leads thirty student representatives in leadership programming. Aiden has highlighted the importance of GSA clubs to the Santa Cruz City Schools board, and spoke at the unveiling of LGBTQ History Posters about the impact of connecting history with future generations. Aiden also participates in the Diversity Center Youth Program, is a member of his school's Garden Club, and is a gracious competitor in wrestling, cross-country, and volleyball. Aiden is described as an empathetic model student who does not back down from doing the work to make positive changes.



LAETITIA VIVIAN CHEN GLADNEY | AWARDEE

Laetitia Vivian Chen Gladney has been an activist since middle school who has had a big impact on their schools and community. As a student at Mission Hill Middle School, Laetitia helped write a grant to financially support the opening of all-gender bathrooms at the school and was also instrumental in advocating for Santa Cruz City School District to purchase and fly the Pride Flag at all district schools. Now at Santa Cruz High School, Laetitia continues their activism by working with school administration to keep all-gender bathrooms open during the entire school day and has helped secure free menstrual products for school bathrooms. In addition to their activism for the LGBTQIA+ community, Laetitia is also a member of the theater department where they advocate for diversity in casting.



LUKA CHAVEZ | AWARDEE

Luka Chavez has been a passionate leader and advocate in their school's GSA since third grade, when they were a founding member of Watsonville Charter School of the Arts (WCSA) GSA Junior club. That year Luka wrote and directed a skit about supporting queer classmates, called "Be Yourself," which was performed for second through sixth grade classes. In fifth grade Luka made and presented a video to the PVUSD board of trustees attesting to the importance of supporting LGBTQIA+ elementary school students and helped lead a school-wide Harvey Milk assembly. In sixth grade Luka was a red carpet emcee for the Queer Youth Leadership awards. Now in seventh grade, Luka volunteers with the Queer Youth Task Force and was a youth panelist for the 2022 Understanding Gender Summit.

Victor Ersunay is the co-president of San Lorenzo Valley Middle School's GSA club, where he works closely with the school's principal to share meeting notes and facilitate positive changes to the school to support LGBTQIA+ students, such as adding a new all-gender bathroom and planning activities during LGBTQIA+ history month. Victor has also worked with the school librarian to include a list of books curated by the GSA to increase students' exposure to the diverse experiences of the LGBTQIA+ community through literature. Victor bravely came out as trangender after returning from distance learning and has since grown in confidence, strengthening the school's GSA club and joining the volleyball team. Victor is described as instrumental to positive change on the San Lorenzo Middle School campus.



AARON GONZALES | NOMINEE

Aaron Gonzales has been an activist in the LGBTQIA+ community for years. Aaron's activism journey began in fifth grade when they became a founding member and the treasurer of the Watsonville Charter School of the Arts (WCSA) GSA Junior Club. Since then, Aaron has spoken at a PVUSD board meeting to thank trustees for their support of LGBTQIA+ students, came out as trangender in front of the whole school at WCSA's Harvey Milk Day event, and been a panelist for the Understanding Gender Summit. This school year Aaron was an active participant in the Queer, Trans, and Allied Student Summit of the Central Coast and is described as a strong leader for the LGBTQIA+ community at Watsonville High School. Aaron was a 2022 Queer Youth Leadership Awardee.

Asher has been dedicated to the performing arts through all four years of high school, and this fall directed their senior show The Bold, The Young, and The Murdered. In addition to theater, Asher has also played three years of high school basketball, founded and led the Pop Culture Club at SLVHS, and wrote their own fantasy column in the school newspaper.

As an openly queer, transgender, and asexual student, Corvinrook inspires younger students on campus to be themselves, and motivates their peers to stand up against prejudice. Corvinrook is active in Scotts Valley high School's theater, where they increase LGBTQIA+ visibility in their lead acting roles. Corvinrook is a leader in the school's Sexuality and Gender Acceptance club, assisting in events for Aromantic Awareness Week, Transgender Day of Visibility, LGBTQIA+ history trivia games, and more. Corvinrook works to overcome racism and transphobia to continue their work to make Scotts Valley High School a more inclusive place.



JAMIE MCLEAN | NOMINEE

they/them/theirs Student, San Lorenzo Valley High School

Jamie McLean is described by their teachers as hard-working, self-disciplined, respectful, professional and considerate. Jamie was co-president of the Pop Culture Club, co-directed the play The Bold, The Young, and The Murdered, and has received two Visual and Performing Arts Awards for their work. As a co-director, Jamie was intentional about respecting and including LGBTQIA+ student performers, making sure everyone introduced themselves with pronouns and respected each other's identities. During the course of the show, Jamie's inclusive leadership inspired one of the actors to come out as transgender. As an out nonbinary person, Jamie often deals with being misgendered and not having their pronouns respected, but continues to live authentically, showing those around them that there's no one right way to be nonbinary.



JUNIPER BROWN | NOMINEE

Juniper Brown is a leader both at the CA Film & Cultural Center's (CAFCC) Diverse Youth Meetups, where they have helped design LGBTQIA+ discord spaces as well as CAFCC's physical location, and is a leader in their community. Juniper runs money-free art swapping and money-free goods swapping communities and has showcased their talents through graphic design, art, and social media work for several local businesses and organizations. Juniper has overcome their shyness attributed to ASD to speak about their experience as a young trans person for a panel for Encompass Community Services and panels for EDI Educators for county health and education staff members. This past fall, Juniper presented the workshop "Guinea Pig Care: The Queerest Pet" at the Queer, Trans, and Allied Student Summit of the Central Coast.



NICO OLMSTEAD | NOMINEE

Nico Olmstead is a leader at his school, work, and in the community. Nico is an active member of Delta's leadership team and helps plan events and activities for the school. Nico is described as having a quiet and calm leadership style and as someone who collaborates with his peers to create positive learning environments for everyone.

Q Licht has been an exceptional advocate for LGBTQIA+ youth for several years. In 2020 he created the Purple Sticker Project to make books with positive LGBTQIA+ representation more accessible in school libraries, a project that is now being used across the county. In 2022 he was a member of the Queer and Trans Youth Council who helped create a survey to gather data on how to support Santa Cruz County high school students' access to all-gender bathrooms. Now a senior in high school, he has been a youth representative for the Safe Schools Project's Top 40 LGBTQIA+ Book List and advocated at the Scotts Valley City Council for LGBTQIA+ inclusive policies. Q is the Scotts Valley Youth of the Year, and was a 2021 Queer Youth Leadership Awardee.

Student, Delta Charter High School | Councilmember, Queer and Trans Youth Council



Before moving to Santa Cruz, Greg worked closely with families in Placer County to support transgender students at school and in the community. This year Greg was the first principal to sign up their school for the Safe Schools Project's LGBTQ+ Model School Pilot Program, and he has worked closely with the school's Gender and Sexuality Diversity Club to ensure their voices are heard during the Pilot Program. Greg is an active member of both the Santa Cruz City Schools LGBTQ+ Task Force and the County Office of Education LGBTQ+ Task Force and his years of support has made Soquel High School a more affirming place for LGBTQIA+ students.

Academic Dean & GSA Club Advisor, Kirby School

Jessa Kirk is the Academic Dean and GSA advisor at Kirby School who works tire-lessly to support LGBTQIA+ students on campus. As GSA advisor, Jessa wrote and received a grant to purchase books by LGBTQIA+ authors for the school library, increasing student access to diverse literary voices. Marile was the co-chair of the capital campaign to buy the building TDC resides in, managed the changes in the facade to create a welcoming appearance, managed the new roof project, and donated furniture to create a comfortable space for LGBTQIA+ youth to gather at TDC. Marile also volunteered to take the forty hour training "Training and Coaching Intensive: Working with LGBTQ+ Youth in Systems of Care" to update her knowledge on LGBTQIA+ issues in order to facilitate trainings on sexual orientation, gender identity, and gender expression. Marile is working to increase understanding, awareness, and acceptance within our community.

Matt Salisbury is the owner of Lightspeed Martial Arts Academy who creates safe spaces for LGBTQIA+ youth wherever he is teaching. At Lightspeed Martial Arts, Matt maintains safe restrooms and changing rooms for all genders, and he makes sure the names and pronouns of his students and employees are respected, gracefully correcting others when needed. Lightspeed Martial Arts' Tae Kwon Do tournaments and martial arts belt testing are non-binary and trans inclusive, creating a rare and much needed safe space for trans and nonbinary athletes. Matt teaches both at his studio and at several local schools, and always teaches every student respect, honor, and open-mindedness. Matt is described as someone who leads by example and is a hero for his students every day.



NADINE SAID | NOMINEE she/her/hers

Librarian, Mission Hill Middle School

Nadine Said is the librarian at Mission Hill Middle School where she has been intentional about increasing LGBTQIA+ visibility and support since her first day on the job. Nadine created a robust collection of books by and about LGBTQIA+ people, and implemented pink stickers on book spines to support students in discreetly finding these books. Nadine updated the library webpage to include links and resources on LGBTQIA+ issues for students and families, and each year she creates LGBTQ+ History Month shelving and wall displays. To increase student readership of LGBTQIA+ literature, Nadine created a reading incentive program where students receive a pride pin or bracelet for every LGBTQIA+ book they read. Nadine's love and kindness makes Mission Hill's library a warm and welcoming environment for all.







The Watsonville Film Festival (WFF) has worked since 2012 to highlight Latine filmmakers and stories that illuminate our shared humanity and inspire positive change, and has made it a priority to feature films with LGBTQIA+ stories, characters, and themes. WFF director Consuelo Alba and her staff are strong allies to the LGBTQIA+ community who work with local youth filmmakers to present their work in the festival. WFF is described as an organization that has and continues to make a profound impact on the Watsonville community by uplifting the voices of youth, LGBTQIA+ people, and other marginalized groups. WFF supports the LGBTQIA+ Latine community and inspires local LGBTQIA+ youth with positive representation on screen and showing them that their stories and their culture matter.



LIGHTSPEED MARTIAL ARTS | NOMINEE



Lightspeed Martial Arts is a martial arts studio in Scotts Valley that consistently creates and maintains safe and supportive athletic opportunities for its students. Under the leadership of owner and Master Matt Salisbury, Lightspeed Martial Arts ensures that spaces and events that are typically aligned to a gender binary are safe and open for people of all genders. In a time when states are enacting legislation to ban transgender and nonbinary athletes from competition, Lightspeed Martial Arts celebrates them by ensuring restrooms and changing rooms are safe for all genders, that tournaments and martial arts belt testing are nonbinary and trans inclusive, and that all staff and participants respect names and pronouns. Lightspeed Martial Arts is a place where LGBTQIA+ athletes can be their authentic selves.

ORGANIZATIONAL ALLY TO QUEER YOUTH AWARD



NIJI DOJO | NOMINEE

Niji Dojo is a martial arts studio in Santa Cruz that offers Brazilian liu-Jitsu, boxing, Muay Thai kickboxing, self defense, yoga, circuit, and recovery classes in a welcoming and affirming place for LGBTQIA+ people. Niji Dojo is described as a special place without the "macho attitude" often associated with martial arts. Niji Dojo is upfront about their inclusion policies and maintains a safe space for trans and nonbinary people to train, and is intentional about being inclusive of all bodies. Niji Dojo provides scholarships to support LGBTQIA+ youth who may be struggling with body image, lacking a feeling of belonging, or just lacking the funds to participate, which has allowed several LGBTQIA+ youth to feel more at home in their bodies and experience the fun and joy of movement.

SAN LORENZO VALLEY MIDDLE SCHOOL (SLVMS) GSA | NOMINEE

San Lorenzo Valley Middle School (SLVMS) GSA club is described as a "safe haven" for LGBTQIA+ and allied students. Under the leadership of Co-Presidents Kel Dennis and Victor Ersunay, and Advisor Rex Olivieri, SLVMS GSA has fostered important conversations among school staff regarding the importance of consistently using accurate pronouns and supporting LGBTQIA+ students at school. This school year the club attended the Queer, Trans, and Allied Student Summit of the Central Coast and provided opportunities for adults on campus to show support for LGBTQIA+ students. SLVMS GSA members are described as determined and self-reliant and as some of the kindest students you'll ever meet. 

What everyone should know about

Bullying

It is against the law!

Bullying violates the following California laws: Ed Code 200, Ed Code 220, AB 9 Seth Law, AB 537, AB 394, AB 777.

BULLYING DEFINED: Bullying is defined as a systematic, deliberate on-going power RESOURCES:

Bullying is defined as a systematic, deliberate, on- going, power based, targeted, hostile and illegal act.

Bullying includes but is not limited to: being made fun of, rumor spreading (whether true or false), being pushed, shoved, tripped, spat on, excluded from a group, being physically or sexually abused. Cyber bullying is the fastest growing type of bullying.

TARGETS:

Bullies select vulnerable targets, systematically train their targets to submit, and seek bystanders who passively accept or actively encourage or join in the act.

Bullying is the second most unreported crime. Fully a third of all students in American schools report being bullied on a daily basis. 160 million students stay home from school each day because they are afraid of being bullied. Bullying hurts everyone: the victim, bystanders and the bullies themselves.

Schools can prevent bullying by teaching anti-bullying through role modeling, early education and prevention programs, staff training, direct intervention and consistent discipline policies that are published and broadcasted to all. Bullying can be stopped by assertive targets, bystanders who speak up and adults who intervene effectively.



Each of us has a role to play to





TARGETED STUDENT

- 1. write down in a journal what happened, the time, the date, who was there and witnessed what took place.
- 2. tell your parents/ guardians what is going on and how you feel about it.
- 3. tell your friends what is going on and ask for support, seek out a trusted teacher, coach, spiritual leader or adult.
- 4. do not act without thinking things through.
- 5. understand that this is not your fault.

TEACHER

- ask the student to tell you how they have been bullied, by whom and what exactly took place.
- 2. ask the student who and what gives them the best support at this time.
- 3. tell the student that you heard them and that you will help them make a plan.

BYSTANDER

- gather friends around the bullied friend and stand together in between the target and the bully.
- 2. with physical violence, film it on your phone and call the police.
- 3. get the target to safety and tell someone.
- 4. if you can't take some action yourself, tell someone you trust who has the power to help.

PARENTS

Recognize your child is being victimized and may feel helpless.

- ask your kid to tell you everything that took place and how they are feeling. Tell them you are there for them and that bullying is wrong.
- 2. talk with supportive confidants about what went on, devise plans to cope with and support yourself and your kid.
- 3. speak to the teachers, administrators and or police for remedies.

ADMINISTRATORS

- 1. arrange to meet with each of the families separately.
- 2. set a designated time to make sure the bullying has stopped.
